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## Chapter 1

### Introduction

The Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan), Govt. of India is working and aiming for the empowerment of persons with disabilities (Divyangjan) since its commencement. This ministry is serving the disabled through its seven delivery models. These are conducting awareness, sensitization and HRD programs, undertaking research & development, providing assistive devices and livelihood for persons with disabilities (Divyangjan) (PwD) in the year 1980 which reinforces the idea of serving disabled. The United Nation declared decade for disabilities (Divyangjan) (1982-1992), which led to the advent of the most of the National Institutions. These Institutes started earlier, were working for the persons with disabilities (Divyangjan) of different individual categories (single disabilities). The decade between 1993-2002 was declared as the Asia pacific decade of the disabled persons. Further extended as extension of Asia Pacific decade for the disabled 2003-2013.

This decade led to the emergence & proposal of the PwD (1995) Act and the National Trust (1999) Act in India. After the proposal of National Trust Act (1999), focus was given to Persons with Multiple disabilities (Divyangjan) and there arose a need to start a National Institute exclusively for Empowerment of persons with Multiple Disabilities (Divyangjan). To achieve the focus given above, National Institute for Empowerment of Persons with Multiple Disabilities (NIEPMD) came in to an existence in the year 2005. The Institute is situated in a beautiful ambience on East Coast Road (ECR) Muttukadu, Chennai, which is 35 kilometers away from the Chennai Central station. Since the commencement in 2005 the services for Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan) for single as well as Multiple Disabilities (Divyangjan) has been given on an outpatient basis through a multi-disciplinary team model, besides the cottage services and extension services.

The Census 2011, of India enumerated data on eight types of disabilities (Divyangjan), including first time entry of multiple disabilities (Divyangjan). This data gave a picture of prevalence of multiple disabilities (Divyangjan) in the country and guide path to NIEPMD in planning various services of rehabilitation for this group of society, Census data, 2011 on disability shows that there are 2.68 crores persons are with disabilities (Divyangjan) in India, which constitute 2.21% of the total population, out of which 21.16 lakhs belong to the category of multiple disabilities (Divyangjan). One of the objectives is to ensure all human rights to disabled persons especially to those who need more intensive support i.e. persons with Multiple Disabilities (Divyangjan).



## **1.1. Aims and Objectives**

The objectives in brief:

- To undertake development of human resource for management, training, rehabilitation, education, employment and social development of persons with Multiple Disabilities.
- To promote and conduct research in all areas relating to Multiple Disabilities.
- To develop Trans-disciplinary models and strategies for social rehabilitation and to meet the needs of diverse groups of people with Multiple Disabilities.
- To undertake services and outreach programs for the persons with Multiple Disabilities.

### **VISION**

The persons with Multiple Disabilities have equal rights to lead a better quality of life. This may be enabled with committed professionalism, accessible environment, equal opportunities, positive attitudes and appropriate, affordable, acceptable and available technological interventions.

### **MISSION**

To provide need based comprehensive rehabilitation through team approach facilitating inclusion, ensuring empowerment of persons with Multiple Disabilities and their families and by substantiating field based research and development of human resources.

## Chapter 2

During the reporting period the council met on 05.06.15, 10.10.15 and 08.03.16. The details of list of Members are as follows.



### 3.2. Short Term Training Programs



## Chapter 5

### Services

Providing suitable rehabilitation services to both the persons with Multiple Disabilities (Divyangjan) and single Disabilities (Divyangjan) including the clients coming with impairment is one of the primary objectives of NIEPMD. This rehabilitation services are coordinated by the Department of Social Work, through Service and Program section. The Service & Program section is having two wings called registration and case history taking unit. The registration unit makes registering the clients and providing necessary information about the institute to the clients and visitors. The registration unit also receives the calls from outside and giving appointments and other information through phone to the general public.

#### Case History taking

The case history taking unit is managed by the Professional Social worker where the Social worker will take the detailed first hand information about the client & their family, covering antenatal care, postnatal care, family history, developmental history, immunization covered, school history and family dynamics. This unit also collects the registration charges and service charges as per the NIEPMD fee structure. Once the procedure of case history taking process is over then the client will be guided to other departments for specific assessment and intervention. Apart from regular services, NIEPMD also conducts special clinics viz., Neurology, Psychiatry and Dental care on every month. The Institute also supplies medicines to persons with disabilities (Divyangjan) for Neurological and Psychiatric conditions.






In the year 2015-16, 5440 clients were registered at NIEPMD and its extension centre. Out of the total registered clients about 1768 were Persons with Multiple Disabilities (Divyangjan) and 3672 were persons with various types of single disability further 82031 had clients had received various rehabilitation services (follow up) at NIEPMD and its extension centre. Among those clients 50217 were persons with Multiple Disabilities (Divyangjan) and 31814 were Single Disabilities (Divyangjan). Since NIEPMD follows the policy of zero percent rejection in registering the persons with disabilities (Divyangjan), all kinds of persons with disabilities (Divyangjan) are registered.



### 5.1 Dept. of Physical Medical Rehabilitation

The Department of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation aims at diagnosing the different conditions that are seen in Persons with Multiple Disabilities (Divyangjan). The causes like stress during pregnancy, diabetes in pregnancy, not consuming folic acids properly before and after pregnancy, viral infections of the mother in last trimester of pregnancy have been contributing to disabilities (Divyangjan). The Speciality clinics viz. Psychiatry, Neurology, Ophthalmology & Dental Clinics are conducted regularly on every month. Rare cases like White matter degeneration of the brain in siblings of families have been registered. More cases of storage disorders and cytomegalo virus infection in pregnant mother causing disability have received special attention. Bone affected by tumor was removed and after radiation it was fitted back, now the client is attending services of NIEPMD for mobility. A child with Microcephaly was brought to NIEPMD for Early Intervention services after craniotomy surgery. The portion of bone of the cranium is removed, the growth of the tissue will be maintained. The child is now acquiring skills. The children with Microcephaly have been availing services at NIEPMD, but this is for the first time such a child after the surgery is acquiring near normal head circumference.

The following units come under this department, Early Intervention, Physiotherapy, Occupational Therapy, Prosthetic & Orthotic Unit. Antiepileptic and anti-psychotic drugs are distributed to the needing clients. 10% of the cost of medicines is being collected so as to ensure that the clients taking the medicines regularly.

#### 5.1.1. Early Intervention Unit

The Unit for Early Intervention renders services to the client with multiple disabilities (Divyangjan) below the age of 3 years. The clients with microcephaly, ADHD, Autistic features motor problems due to birth asphyxia, syndromes due to gene deletion, getservices from this unit. Multi sensory approach along with neuro-developmental therapy is practiced after assessing the children in six areas – Sensory, Motor, Cognition, Language, Emotional and Social development. Individual family support program is developed and mothers are involved in development of skills in their children. The home training program was conducted during the month of July 2016. The professionals visited the house of children in all Saturday and Sundays and elaborated the parents, grand parents, siblings and neighbours the way to deal with such children. The materials available at home were utilized to give activities at home. The natural surroundings near the houses gives lot of sensory inputs to the kits. In some houses there were birds and farm animals, the sounds of the animals and feel of the animals were utilized to develop sensory area. Many households had millets and paddy, vegetables and fruits in the garden. Parents were thought to make use of above items in tactile development of the child. NIEPMD also provided teaching learning materials to them and are made use of to develop skills by the parents. The details of clients for the year 2015-16 as follows.

#### 5.1.2. Physiotherapy Unit

Physiotherapy provides services to individuals and populations to develop maintain and restore maximum movement and functional ability throughout the life span. This includes providing services in circumstances where movement and function are threatened by ageing, injury, pain, diseases, disorders, conditions leading to disability and environmental factors.

#### Role of Physiotherapist

Physiotherapist can act as first contact practitioners and patients/clients may seek direct services without referral from another health care professional.



Physiotherapists are highly qualified health professionals who work in partnership with their patients to help people get better and stay well.

Physiotherapists also work closely with General practitioners and other health clinicians to plan and manage treatment.

Using advanced techniques and evidence-based care, physiotherapists assess, diagnose, treat and prevent a wide range of health conditions and movement disorders. Physiotherapy helps repair damage, reduce stiffness and pain, manage spasticity, increase mobility and improve quality of life.

Physiotherapy extends from health promotion to injury prevention, acute care, rehabilitation, maintenance of functional mobility, chronic disease management, patient and care education and occupational health.

The main focus of Physiotherapy unit in NIEPMD for children with multiple disabilities (Divyangjan) are Neuro Developmental Therapy (NDT), Virtual Reality Based therapy (VRBT), Pulmonary Rehabilitation, Electrotherapy & Gait training. Department also consists of Electrotherapy unit which is more commonly used for pain management and muscle re-education.

NDT is a holistic and interdisciplinary clinical practice model informed by current and evolving research that emphasizes individualized therapeutic handling based on movement analysis for habilitation and rehabilitation of individuals with neurological pathophysiology.

The aim of the treatment for children with disabilities (Divyangjan) due to brain damage is to prepare and guide them towards their greatest possible independence and to prepare them as normal adolescences and adult life. Gait training or gait rehabilitation is the act of learning/relearning how to walk, either as a child, or more frequently, after sustaining an injury or disability.

Gait training helps to strengthen muscles, improves balance and posture, develops muscle memory, builds endurance, and retrains the legs for repetitive motion.

Electrotherapy is derived from the word Electro – Electric Current / Electrical Energy, Therapy – Treatment of disease, Non-surgical treatment approach. It means various forms of therapeutic applications using electrical energy as primary source. Electrotherapy is mainly used for Pain management, treatment of neuromuscular dysfunction, improves range of joint mobility, tissue repair, acute and chronic edema, peripheral blood flow, iontophoresis, urine and fecal incontinence.

Virtual Reality Based therapy (VRBT) is new generation tool for advanced rehabilitation which uses motion sensor (Gestures) technology to capture patient movements which can be

associated with therapeutic games as a treatment regime.

VRBT incorporates therapeutic techniques such as positional stretch, tone facilitation and inhibition through game which makes therapy session enjoyable and patient gets benefitted through motor relearning and patterning of movement using visual cues so they will stay self motivated and engaged throughout rehabilitation regime.

Pulmonary rehabilitation is provided for clients with respiratory problems. Rehabilitation program are provided to the clients to improve their ventilatory function.



### **5.1.3 Occupational Therapy Unit**

Occupational therapy is the art and science of facilitating human participation in occupation (i.e., self-care, leisure and work tasks) to restore, reinforce and enhance performance, facilitate learning of skills and functions essential for adaptation and productivity, diminish pathology, and promote health.

An occupational therapy evaluation will assess a client's gross motor, fine motor, visual motor, visual perceptual, handwriting, daily living and sensory processing skills. The use of standardized assessment tools, non-standardized assessment tools, parent interview and clinical observations will be used to assess the child's performance.

After completing detailed occupational therapy evaluation the clients patterns of strength and need that impact daily performance of functional tasks such as eating, dressing and writing are identified. Based on that individualized treatment intervention will be provided to empower the clients to reach the maximal level.

In the Occupational Therapy Unit the clients with multiple disability, uni-disability like Cerebral Palsy associated with Mental Retardation, Autism Spectrum Disorder, Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD), Learning Disability, seizure disorder, Neurological, orthopedic, Psychiatric conditions, other Developmental Disabilities (Divyangjan) are provided services.

Occupational Therapy unit functions mainly in three major divisions named as General Occupational Therapy Unit (G.O.T), Sensory Stimulation Unit, (S.S) and Sensory Integration Unit (S.I). In addition to this the Occupational Therapy unit had established a visual stimulation for the children with ASD, children with low vision etc., its mainly focuses on Auditory Integration Therapy (AIT), Visual Integration Therapy (VIT), other sensory deficits related to ADL.

In addition to this the Occupational Therapy unit adjoining with Dept of DAIL, works for pre-vocational skill training, pre-vocational resettlement training for person with multiple disabilities (Divyangjan). Clients with various multiple disabilities (Divyangjan) have been benefitted by Occupational Therapy services.

Occupational Therapist plays a major role in field of Multiple Disability –Rehabilitation, and their major roles are 1. Identification of functional deficits & capacities, 2. Development of functional capacities through activities, 3. Integration of functional abilities into daily living tasks.

The Occupational therapy treatment encompasses several areas of performance. All treatment plans and therapy goals are created and implemented based on the individual needs.

- ◆ Fine Motor Skills: Pertaining to movement and dexterity of the small muscles in the hands and fingers.
- ◆ Gross Motor Skills: Pertaining to movement of the large muscles in the arms, legs and trunk.
- ◆ Visual Motor Skills: Referring to a child's movement based on the perception of visual information.
- ◆ Self-Care Skills: Pertaining to daily dressing, feeding and toileting tasks.
- ◆ Sensory Integration: The ability to take in, sort out and respond to the information that is received from the world.
- ◆ Motor Planning Skills: The ability to plan, implement and sequence motor tasks.
- ◆ Neuromotor Skills: Pertaining to the underlying building blocks of muscle strength, muscle tonicity, postural mechanisms and reflex integration.
- ◆ Adaptation/Modification, prescription of Splints & adaptive devices for clients with neurological/Orthopedic/Geriatric clients.

Occupational Therapist (O.T's) uses purposeful activities to enhance and encourage skill development. Guided by the client's interests, the therapist provides fun and motivating activities that aim to provide a "just-right challenge" so that the child will develop the underlying skills needed to effectively complete functional tasks. The goal of occupational therapy treatment is to use meaningful activities to assist the client's in achieving functional skills needed for daily living.

When skill and strength cannot be developed or improved, occupational therapy offers creative solutions and alternatives for carrying out daily activities by adaptation/modification.

The staffs of the Occupational Therapy department have also involved in teaching and delivering lectures in various HRD program- both long term and short term programs of the institute.

#### 5.1.4. Material Development-Aids & Appliances (Prosthetic & Orthotic) Unit

Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan) affected with neuromusculoskeletal impairment/ deformity require different types of assistive devices to overcome their muscle weakness, joint instability, loss of limb, impaired/ reduced mobility, poor sitting posture etc. These types of assistive devices empowered the PwDs in restoration of psychological and emotional confidence, financial gain, participation in society activities and quality of life.

This unit provide services to the different groups of beneficiaries, who are in need of assistive devices for mobility, seating, activities of daily living, replacement of amputated/lost body part/s. Various types of assistive devices like Prosthesis, Orthosis, adaptive devices and seating devices are fabricated, fitted and trained to the user.

Prosthesis is an artificial bio-mechanical device which is intended to use in place of amputated/lost body parts either due to congenial anomaly or amputation. Prosthetic devices-improve cosmetic appearance, safe and balance mobility, functional activities, and assist in day to day activities. Lower limb prosthesis is fitted to the lower limb and upper limb prosthesis to the upper limb.

Orthosis is a mechanical device fitted to the affected body part/s which is weakened, deformed, misaligned and impaired function. It uses to support, control, correct, prevent and align the body part, by application of force. Various types of orthoses are used according to involvement of body part, for example spinal orthosis for spine, lower limb orthosis for lower limb and upper limb orthosis for upper limb.

Seating devices are designed to improve the head and neck control, postural control, seating balance and tolerance. Many children with delay development, cerebral palsy etc are benefitted with such devices.

Adaptive devices are meant for activities of daily living such as eating, bathing, and writing etc. Adaptive device helps and assist in improving the functional level.

This unit also involve in customization and modification of prefabricated aids and appliances to make suitable for use. Various categories of professional and non professional rehabilitation stake holders are trained and orientated by this unit on the issue of importance and usage of such devices.

The service protocol involves registration, assessment, prescription, measurement, fabrication, trial, fitment and training about the prescribed appliance followed by the follow-up and reviews schedule for optimal outcomes. As and when require the necessary repairing and replacement of appliances are also taken care by this unit.

Aids and appliances are provided under the ADIP scheme. This unit also involve in outreach/camp activities for identification and assessment and distribution of aids and appliances at door level for unreached population.

## 5.2 Department of Clinical Psychology

The Department of Clinical Psychology comprises of professionals from Clinical and Rehabilitation Psychology as part of the multi-disciplinary team of NIEPMD, working towards the psychological issues in disability rehabilitation. The department executes the rehabilitation services by performing psychological assessments and providing interventions based on psychological principles. Standardized assessment tools are used to assess the development / Intellectual functioning of the individuals, which helps in planning the education and therapeutic programs of the persons with disabilities (Divyangjan). Cognitive functioning, Specific Learning Disability assessment, Personality tests, Neuropsychological and Psycho-diagnostic assessments are also done to assess the various psychological profiles of the individuals.

As part of the interventions, Behaviour Management is provided for those individuals to reduce maladaptive behaviour and to improve adaptive behaviour. Further, Cognitive Enhancement techniques are provided to improve the cognitive functioning of the persons with disabilities (Divyangjan). The department ensures the involvement of family members during the therapeutic sessions, which enables them to observe, learn and implement the same techniques at home. Group therapies are also conducted for the parents / family members to overcome their psychological distress and to improve their personal skills in dealing with persons with disabilities (Divyangjan). Cognitive rehabilitation and psychotherapy are also provided for various behavioral and emotional problems of persons with multiple disabilities (Divyangjan) and to the family members.

Psychiatric Clinic is conducted bi-monthly to ensure the medical requirements of persons with psychiatric co-morbidity. A multi-dimensional approach is being practiced to provide holistic interventions to improve the mental health and the quality of life of persons with disabilities (Divyangjan).

The department is also associated with the Medical Board of the State Government of Tamil Nadu, to provide psychological assessments for the clients with mental retardation, mental illness and multiple disabilities (Divyangjan) applying for the Disability Certificate. A professional from the department is deputed once in a week, to the State Resource Training Centre, K.K. Nagar, Chennai, to provide the said services.

### Human Resource Development

The department conducts two year program in M. Phil Clinical Psychology with an intake of six scholars per year. The scholars are provided clinical supervision and training in handling the clients with disabilities (Divyangjan) and mental health issues. Apart from clinical training they are also imparted with knowledge in research skills, so as to execute research project as part of their course curriculum. The analytical skills of the scholars are also enhanced by conducting Case Conferences, Journal Club, Movie Club, etc. On completion of the first batch the following were the dissertations submitted to the University of Madras in partial fulfillment of M. The department was also involved in developing human resource by organizing various CRE programs, in updating the knowledge in the diagnosis, interventions and rehabilitation of persons with multiple disabilities (Divyangjan). Parental training programs were also conducted to address their emotional and other psychological issues that are pertaining due to the disability condition prevailing in the family.

### 5.3 Dept. of Special Education

The Department of Special Education is playing a very vital role in rehabilitating the individuals with multiple disabilities (Divyangjan). It holds the responsibility of developing appropriate service delivery model for individuals with multiple disabilities (Divyangjan). Another important role of the Department is to develop human resources in the field of special education who will work with the individuals with multiple disabilities (Divyangjan). Preparation of teaching learning materials and adaptive devices to facilitate the functions of persons with multiple disabilities (Divyangjan) is part of the program of the department. The Department of special education also reaches individuals with multiple disabilities (Divyangjan) by conducting various training program in collaboration with SSA, RMSA under the Department of Education of respective State Governments. Facilitation of inclusive education and to develop the training modules for in-service teachers and other professionals to carry out the task of inclusive education is also one of the programs of department.

**MODEL SCHOOL FOR MULTIPLE disabilities (Divyangjan)**

Model school for persons with multiple disabilities (Divyangjan) is being run successfully to provide the various educational and other rehabilitation services in the school atmosphere. The children registered in the Model School belong to the category of multiple disabilities (Divyangjan) in varying combinations. The model school has different units namely Early Childhood Special Education Unit, Cerebral palsy with Additional Disabilities (Divyangjan) Unit, Autism with Additional Disabilities (Divyangjan) unit, Deafblindness with Additional Disabilities (Divyangjan) unit, transition unit and Severe and Profound Multiple Disabilities (Divyangjan) unit. As the unit changes, the methodology of teaching and the core focus area varies based on the needs of the said group of children. The program of each child carried out in the school is well informed to the parents through conducting regular parent teacher meeting and during daily interaction with them as it is mandatory that parents/guardians should accompany the clients when they come to Model School.

The model school is also working as place to provide practical exposure to trainee teachers in their concerned area of specialization. The trainee teachers of HRD programs carry out various practical assignments and researches in the area of multiple disabilities (Divyangjan) in various Units of the Model School as a part of their course curriculum. The teacher-student ratio has maintained at 1:8 with mild to moderate challengeable group and 1:4 with severe and profound challengeable group as it requires more special attention and facilities. About 135 children were enrolled in the model school during the year 2015-16.

### 5.3.2 Early Childhood Special Education Unit

Early Childhood Special Education (ECSE) unit of Model School is focusing on the children belonging to the age of 3 to 6 years. In ECSE unit, all possible combinations of children with multiple disabilities (Divyangjan) are being imparted training with early literacy and functional skills. Depending upon the progress and needs of the child, the education plan is decided by the department and places in various educational settings ranging from inclusive education to special school placement. The children those who are successfully placed in inclusive education settings, the unit provides school support services for them to overcome the initial challenges faced in a new settings. The children are given admission in respective units based on the need of the individual on successful completion of the program at ECSE unit. They will continue to receive their education in other unit of model school.

### 5.3.3 Deafblind with Additional Disabilities Unit

The activities of the Deafblind Unit is unique as each person with Deafblindness is different from one another to the degree of visual and hearing impairment that results in various associated problems and Interferes with the growth & development of the child. The major areas that are given importance are communication, accessing information, orientation and mobility, functional academics, transition and vocational activities. Special strategies such as coactive signing, tangible symbols are used to develop communication. Tactile mode along with residual sensory abilities helps to explore and learn from the classroom activities. Real life experiences, real objects are used to develop concepts in children in early education level. The children with deafblindness students are also exposed to specially designed tactile garden. There were 21 clients enrolled in the Unit during 2015-16.

### 5.3.4. Autism with Additional Disabilities Unit



Persons affected by Autism with additional disabilities (Divyangjan) involving play activities in Autism Unit.

ASD Unit has admitted 34 Children having Autism with Additional Disabilities (Divyangjan). The Unit is further divided into three sections viz. primary, secondary, & transition. Age range assign to each section is 6-10 years for primary, 10-14 years secondary & 14-18 years for transition. In each section, there are 8 to 10 children are studying. During the admission, the children were assessed with Childhood Autism Scale Rating (CARS), Psycho Educational Profile (PEP's) and Functional Assessment Checklist for Programming (FACP) tools for identifying their current level functions and implementing the Individualized Educational Program. In this unit the children were trained to use communication both verbal and non-verbal mode using PECS method. Based on the assessment, these children are provided with structured classroom teaching using appropriate teaching learning materials (TLM) and visual strategies for their better learning

### 5.3.5. Severe and Profound Multiple Disabilities Unit

There were 12 children admitted in the Unit, who are predominantly Cerebral Palsy, Mental Retardation with seizure disorder and low vision. These children were assessed with FACP care group and severe profound program assessment checklist during their admission to see their level of functioning. Based on the assessment, the long and short term goals was planned and implemented. The children were provided individual care during their visit to the Unit and IEP were implemented. Each child was provided communication files to do functional communication and parents were provided home program to care their children in functional academics, communication development, mobility, self-help skills, positioning and lifting. There are different combination of children with multiple disabilities (Divyangjan) admitted in the unit.

### 5.3.6 Transition Unit

Understanding the diverse need of individuals with multiple disabilities (Divyangjan) and the importance of transition, NIEPMD have established Transition Unit in Model School to cater services to the children who would be promoted to vocational training from school. Transition Unit will stand as a base for future vocational prospect of individuals with multiple disabilities (Divyangjan). The unit shall focus to identify the interest area of vocation, and possible avenues and abilities of the individual to achieve vocational independence ensuring maximum utilization of the potentials of the individual. There were 8 individuals with multiple disabilities (Divyangjan) got enrolled in the Transition Unit.

### 5.4 Department of Speech, Hearing & Communication

The Department of Speech, Hearing and Communication provides rehabilitation and habilitation to the children and adult having issues with auditory and communication problems. The department constitutes of two sub units; The Audiology unit and the Speech Language Pathology Unit. Both the units have clientele across the life span. However the majority of the clients in clinic constitute of persons having Audiological and Communication issues consequent to other handicapping conditions like. Cerebral Palsy, Mental Retardation, Autism Spectrum Disorders, Deaf Blindness etc. The departmental activity includes providing a complete audiological test battery protocol for the children & adults, comprehensive communication assessment, evidence based intervention and hearing aid trial & fitting. Hearing aids are tried prescribed and provided to clients requiring them. A group of clients have CAPD (Central Auditory Processing Disorders) who are counseled and are prescribed modifications so as to have better auditory capabilities. A new two stage protocol for distribution of Hearing aids under the ADIP scheme was successfully tried on 500

and more clients in the districts of Odisha and Uttar Pradesh. The frame work was based upon the ICF Model prescribed by WHO (2001) keeping in view the CBR model of Empowerment.




Figure: Identifying the weak links in the process of empowerment for the PwHI addressed through camps as per the ICF Model prescribed by the WHO (2001).





Fig: The kit and the course content for the one day training are provided to the electronic technicians of the locality where the camp was to be held. The ET was empowered for trouble shooting, care and maintenance and basic counseling.

The intervention provided in the department of speech language pathology preliminarily focuses on the trans-disciplinary approach where the therapy is predominantly child centered. The speech pathologist work along with allied professionals and provides an inclusive early intervention therapy for children below three years. Later the speech therapist, special educators, communication instructors along with other rehabilitation professionals work together and provide group as well as individual therapy for children with multiple disabilities (Divyangjan). The speech therapy services are extended to the model school where in the school speech therapist work along with the special educators to enhance the communication in the classroom setup. The department provides evidence based therapy for children with various childhood communication disorders and also helps to manage the drooling & feeding difficulties. The department also provides home based therapy services where in the parents are given demonstration of the activities that enhances the communication skill of the child by joint action routines by extending to the home environment. Furthermore, it extends its services to the regular and inclusive schools by identifying the children at the risk of developing language disorders, language learning difficulties, fluency and voice disorders.

The department is not only involved in providing auditory verbal therapy for children with hearing impairment but also teaches Indian Sign Language for the adults and children who needs and appreciate the alternate mode of communication.

Apart from the clinical services to the children and adult, the department is also involved in human resource development programs by providing Indian Sign Language classes for the allied professionals at the institution, training and guiding students of Bachelors in Audiology and Speech Language Pathology and Masters of Rehabilitation science hailing from various other organizations. Furthermore, it has been actively drawn in conducting CRE programs to the rehabilitation professionals.

#### 5.5 Department of Social Work:

The Department of Social Work links between the departments of the institute and the clients coming for various services. All the clients registered for the services are observed thoroughly by the department. It also provides counseling and guidance to the clients to visit various departments of NIEPMD and various organizations outside NIEPMD for availing holistic care and services to the clients. This department also enlightens the parent on various schemes and programs for the family members having persons with disabilities (Divyangjan) and also educates the parents on the procedure to avail the schemes and programs for the empowerment of the family. The parents, those come out with the issues related to the disability in the family are also been suitably intervened by the social worker by applying social work methods to help them to cope-up with the problems more successfully. The department also provides comprehensive diagnosis report about the family member having disability and means to handle the problem in an effective manner.

### 5.5.2 Family Cottage Service:

The services of family cottage is provided to the out station clients those who seek NIEPMD for services. This facility is provided on the appointment basis and it is availed by the clients for a period of 7 to 10 days. This provision gives the clients and their family to reside at NIEPMD campus for a short-term period, helping the client to get assessed, counseled and to plan the home-based programs as per the recommendations of the professionals. A total of 112 persons with multiple disabilities (Divyangjan) along with their family have been provided the family cottage services in the year 2015-2016 and the charges are being received from the clients as per the NIEPMD norms

### 5.5.3. Respite Care Centre:

Respite care is the provision of short-term, temporary relief to those who are caring for family members who might otherwise require permanent placement in a facility outside the home.

Respite care centre is a planned short-term and time limited breaks for families and other unpaid to support and maintain the primary care giving relationship. Respite care also provides experience for the person receiving care.

Features of NIEPMD Respite Care Centre

- ❖ Function between 09.00 A.M to 05.30 P.M FROM Monday to Friday.
- ❖ The charges for the respite care centre is Rs.75/- per day.
- ❖ The parents or guardian who are dropping their wards to the respite care centre should give in writing a request.

#### 5.6.1 Information & Communication Technologies (ICT) Lab

New learning methodologies for Persons with disabilities (Divyangjan) include Information Communication Technologies (ICT) and Assistive Technology (AT). They offer significant improvements in inclusion, development, e-learning and education particularly for Persons with Multiple Disabilities (Divyangjan). They assist and support them as vital enablers in their path for equal employment and independent living opportunities.

Below are the Information Communication Technology and Assistive Technology implemented along with Computers and Internet in the Lab. The facilities will be expanded for the requirements of the students.



Objectives of Information and Communication Technology Training:-

- ◆ Access to Technology aided skills and communication development by Computers
- ◆ Adaptations through Assistive Technology for Individual's abilities
- ◆ Training modules to develop listening, speaking reading and writing, drawing, mathematical skills
- ◆ Knowledge acquisition, encouragement for collaborative efforts and updates through network connectivity.

In this connection a new unit "Information and Communication Technology Lab" for persons with Special Needs, was established in this year in pursuance with the current trends in learning and training with Assistive Devices like, Refreshable Braille Display, Track ball mouse, Camera mouse, Foot pedal mouse, Large print Keyboard, Clevy Keyboard, NVDA- Non-Visual Desktop Access etc. With the main objective "Access to technology aided skills" the adults with Multiple Disabilities (Divyangjan) were given training to learn and acquire Reading, Writing, Math skills and communication skills. This unit was inaugurated by Shri. Thaawar Chand Gehlot, our Honourable Union Minister for Social Justice and Empowerment, Shri.S.Awanish Kumar Awasthi, I.A.S. Joint secretary, (DEPwDs, MSJ&E,GOI), Shri.Lov Verma, I.A.S. Secretary (DEPwDs, MSJ&E,GOI), Along with Shri.S.Sankara Narayanan, Deputy Registrar, NIEPMD, Chennai, and Shri.Nachiket Rout, Director, (Incharge) NIEPMD, Chennai, on 21<sup>st</sup> August 2015.


Refreshable Braille Display

It also serves as an alternative to convert into Braille and print large voluminous text books as a digital Braille reader.

AZABAT, is a Touch Typing Tutor software that assist persons with visual impairments, learning difficulties, intellectual and developmental disabilities (Divyangjan) to learn typing in the computer keyboard through a series of practice sessions and exercises. The whole typing process is voice enabled. It also helps in learning Braille.

### 5.6.2 Introduction of Income generation Programmes

To promote the Economic status of the families with PwMDs a course on Tailoring & Embroidery was introduced in co-ordination with the Vocational Rehabilitation centre, for physically handicapped, Guindy. Till date 4 batches were trained and the total beneficiaries were 59 family members of PwMD. They were also provided sewing machines with the assistance of Indian Bank; NIEPMD & Geetha bhavan. Currently 5<sup>th</sup> batch training is going on, started on 18/02/2016. In this batch 22 beneficiaries are undergoing training, of them 2 are persons with multiple disabilities (Divyangjan) from our domestic training unit.



- ◆ Develop a high-quality skilled workforce.



**5.6.4 Knowledge Initiative Program for Parents**

On 12/01/2016 a new program for the benefit of parents was inaugurated on the motive of making the parents better equipped about various disabilities (Divyangjan) and the management. Under this program experts and experienced people share views and information on various topics, which is very much beneficial to the parents of PWMDs. They are provided with books and CDs about the management, materials, methodology about various disabilities (Divyangjan) and coping strategies.





After initiation of the centre, 10 different topics have been covered and discussed. Around 40-50 parents attended the sessions and share their thoughts and clear their doubts.

#### Objectives:

1. Getting Knowledge about various disability
2. Getting Knowledge about external worlds.
3. Know teaching – Learning Materials for various disability and its uses  
(Stimulating sense organs)
4. Inspirit / Motivate Parents to overcome stress.
5. Infrastructure development for better learning.

#### 5.6.5 Sublimation Printing

NIEPMD established a new unit on 12/01/2016 for the empowerment of persons with Multiple Disabilities (Divyangjan) where in the Department of Adult Independent Living (DAIL) joined with the noble responsibility of providing vocational training & economic empowerment, to ensure better quality of life to the persons with multiple disabilities (Divyangjan). At this juncture, DAIL is organizing skill training programme under SIPDA scheme to strengthen the Economic status of Adult with Multiple Disabilities (Divyangjan) & their families.





Under this motive, a course on "Sublimation Printing and Office Assistant" has been introduced for persons with disabilities (Divyangjan). The total numbers of beneficiaries are 20 persons with Multiple Disabilities (Divyangjan).

### Success Story 1

Empowering is a continuous process, right from the stage of Identification. One such achievement is described in the success stories that happened in the life of Mr.G.Suratha.

Mr.G.Suratha 23 years old approached NIEPMD on 11th June 2012 .He was assessed by multi-disciplinary team and Diagnosed as a person with Mental Retardation with associated condition in Speech Difficulties. He is independent in daily living skills. Further referred to Department of Adult Independent Living where a detailed Vocational training was designed and imparted in the areas of personal skills, domestic skills, safety skills, sex education, orientation & mobility, work behaviour, functional academic skills etc. His individual abilities and capacities were identified and trained.

He hails from a very poor and a broken family background. Being 2<sup>nd</sup> child of the family he is supported by all the family members especially his elder brother and younger sister and mother.

Within a period of 3 years, he reached the path of success, by systematic training with the support of vocational instructors. More emphasis of training was given in personal hygiene skills where there is immediate acceptance by family & community members.

Seeing his presentation skills, he was given a job at NIEPMD library as an assistant in arrange books in order, and to maintain it dust free and clean, every one visiting the library appreciate. By rearranging the library books every day, cutting the important news from daily papers and maintaining for official purpose, arranging daily paper in order, whenever required making photo copies for visitors and carefully operating Xerox Machine in NIEPMD, he earns an amount Rs.3000/- per month with the support of Vocational Instructors and other staff members.

## Success Story 2



Master. Harish Kumar, 11 months old male child with small head circumference, Low vision and delayed motor development, came to NIEPMD, lagging development in all the areas. Various intervention strategies offered to him, helped to go ahead in development. The neuro-developmental therapy, multi-sensory stimulation, activities to develop cognition and fine motor skills, vocalization to improve communication and visual stimulation were the strategies followed for skill development. He has been receiving the above therapies one hour per day for 3 days a week.

He achieved trunk balance, standing with minimum support, walking with human support and sitting without support. He also crawls with support. He expresses his personal needs by vocalization. He has started focusing on objects and faces.

### Success Story 3



Shri.Prabu, 34 years old, Graduated and respectful man. He came to Occupational Therapy department for a detailed evaluation to find out the problems relevant to occupational therapy.


Through the detailed Occupational Therapy assessment he is diagnosed as a Spinal Cord Injury - Quadriplegic (SCI). The major problem identified in occupational performance components are bed mobility, transfers, ADL self care skills, IADL skills like accessing computer , writing etc, upper limb based activities, occupational settlement etc.,

In Occupational Therapy unit, a individualized Occupational Therapy interventions for his above mentioned problems were scheduled. The major approaches used during the therapy sessions were Rehabilitation Approach, NDT, PNF, Bio-mechanical approach, and other various O.T handling techniques like adaptations& modifications, energy conservation and work simplification, Care givers training were used on need based.

Based on his need two assistive / adaptive devices were prepared to fulfill his accessibility to the computer skills and writing. With the help of this Adapted Typing Device, now he is able to access the computer independently.

With the help of modified dorsal cock up – with adapted pen holder now he is able to write independently. Now he is satisfactorily resettled and started using the adapted device during his office work.

#### Success Story 4



Master E.Santhosh, 12 year 2 months old, active and co-operative boy. He came to Occupational Therapy department for a detailed evaluation to find out the problems relevant to occupational therapy.

Through the detailed Occupational Therapy assessment he is diagnosed as a Cerebral Palsy associated with MR. The major problems identified in his occupational performance components are age inappropriate Gross motor, fine motor, pre writing skills, cognitive-perceptual skills, ADL self care skills, and play skills.

In Occupational Therapy unit, individualized Occupational Therapy interventions were scheduled for his above mentioned problems. The major approaches used during the therapy sessions Play based therapy, NDT, PNF, Roods approach, Bio-mechanical approach, and other various O.T handling techniques.

Through the interventions he achieved the following skills like upper limb- proximal stability, trunk control skills and fine motor skills. Through this skills his hand function skills like reach, grasp, carry release skills are improving satisfactorily. It has impacted in his pre-writing skills Eg, scribbling, drawing vertical line, horizontal lining etc., He is also able to maintain kneeling with self support and he can perform activities like ball throwing, peg board games, cognitive perceptual skills etc. Through the play based learning his anticipatory control and along with motor praxis abilities are improving satisfactorily. His indoor mobility skills like floor to bed, bed to floor, reaching bathroom etc., are improving through the intervention strategies. He is using his hand in exploring, assisting and cooperating in basic self care ADL skills like brushing, eating and grooming skills like combing, cleaning, etc.,

Proper home program was given to the parents to achieve his age appropriate development.

### Success Story 5

Master. Suryanshu Motharana, 6 year old premature baby with congenital pneumonia kept in ICU for three months after birth and diagnosed as Cerebral palsy (athetoid).



When they came to NIEPMD on the month of February 2016, child had poor trunk control with poor balance in sitting, doesn't have standing and walking. He is able to sit with hand propping in front and move from place to place through bottom shuffling.

He underwent Physiotherapy treatment session based on Neuro-Developmental Therapy (NDT) unit. The Therapy session mainly focused on pre ambulatory techniques like facilitation of trunk control, balance training in sitting, independent sitting and crawling. In gait training unit he was given training on parallel bar walking, treadmill training and stair climbing activities. Now he is able to walk with minimal support and to climb stairs with unilateral support.

## Chapter 6

### **Scheme of Assistance to Disabled Persons for Purchase / fitting of Aids and Appliances (ADIP) Services**

NIEPMD is one of the implementing agencies for distribution of assistive devices for persons with disabilities (Divyangjan). The main aim of the scheme of assistance to disabled persons for Purchase/Fitting of Aids and Appliances to promote physical, social, psychological rehabilitation of Persons with disabilities (Divyangjan) by reducing the effects of disabilities (Divyangjan) and at the same time enhances their economic potential. Assistive devices are given to PwDs with an aim to improve their independent functioning, and to arrest the extent of disability and occurrence of secondary disability.

## Chapter 7

### Research & Development

Research and development is one of the important aims and objectives of the Institute. The primary function is to discover and create new knowledge about scientific and technological topics for the purpose of uncovering and enabling development of valuable new products, process and services for persons with Multiple Disabilities (Divyangjan). The faculty members of the various departments are actively involved in carrying out research projects aimed to provide quality care to the Persons with Multiple Disabilities (Divyangjan). The institute encourages such projects by providing intramural funding and other infrastructure. The Academic committee has been formed to provide guidance for the Research projects. The details of the research projects thus undertaken are as follows:-

#### **1. Existing service provisions for Persons with Multiple Disabilities (Divyangjan) in India- A database compilation**

Persons with Multiple Disabilities (Divyangjan) do have a combination of various disabilities (Divyangjan) that may include: Physical mobility, mental retardation, visual, hearing and other associated disabilities (Divyangjan). Thus there is a need to have a data bank pertaining to the existing services and service models available in the whole country.

Duration of the project is 3 years and the estimated cost of the project is Rs. 10 lakhs and it is carried out in the department of Social Work. An amount of Rs. 7,74,000/- has been spent for this project till date.

#### **Aim:**

To provide a compiled data base of the existing organizations, institutes rendering their services for persons with multiple disabilities (Divyangjan) in India.

#### **Objectives:**

- To compile and categorize the address of the organization/institutions(s) working for persons with multiple disabilities (Divyangjan).
- To compile information pertaining to the services available to persons with multiple disabilities (Divyangjan) all over India.
- To review information pertaining to the service delivery models available for persons with multiple disabilities (Divyangjan).



- To refer the outstation cases to the organization/institute(s) for long term rehabilitation.
- To assess the needs of the NGOs to provide effective services for persons with multiple disabilities (Divyangjan).

**Expected outcome:**

- Data bank of list of organization/institution(s) providing services for persons with multiple disabilities (Divyangjan).
- District wise directory of organization/institution(s) will be documented.
- To compile nationwide data for further research
- To develop unique service delivery model at NIEPMD
- Networking with NGOs working in Tamil Nadu and other states.
- Publication and presentation.

**Current status:**

- Project completed with consent received from 204 organizations across the country to print their detail of services providing for Persons with Multiple Disabilities (Divyangjan) in the directory.
- Report has been prepared and yet to printed.
- Project is waiting for the approval from academic council, once it gets approved directory will be published.

**2. Study of sleep patterns in children with multiple disabilities (Divyangjan) and its effect in day to day functioning:**

This study is completed and being process for publication. Children with late onset of sleep were given Medication for regularizing sleep. The other were taught how to take care of sleep hygiene. Those who required additional calorie at late night advanced adequate calorie intake before sleep. The publication of the article will help persons with disabilities (Divyangjan) to regularize their sleep pattern.

- All the National Institutes need to develop a handbook on Geriatric Rehabilitation of specific disabilities (Divyangjan) as per mandate of the NIs.
- A National Institute for Empowerment of Geriatric Individuals with disabilities (Divyangjan) may be established with zone based Regional Centres

## Chapter 10

### Training Programs for Persons with Disabilities, their families, grass root level workers, rehabilitation professionals and Distribution of Laptops to SC/ST community under SC/ST Grant

As per the census 2011 differently abled population, the proportion of disabled among social groups 2.45% belongs to Schedule Caste & 2.05 belongs to Schedule Tribe. The persons with disabilities (Divyangjan) and their families are doubly disadvantaged due to disability and the caste. In view of that to improve the capacity of persons with disabilities (Divyangjan) and families belonging to SC/ST community and to improve the service status of the SC/ST, various programs were planned and executed in the year 2015 - 2016.

One of the objectives of NIEPMD is to provide knowledge on disability prevention and rehabilitation for the person with disabilities (Divyangjan), parents having children with disabilities (Divyangjan); rehabilitation professionals In addition to it under SC/ST grant, similar training programme had conducted in Schedule Caste and Schedule Tribe population.

### **11.3. Work done under RTI Act 2005**

The Right to Information Act 2005(RTI) is an act of the Parliament of India to provide for setting out the practical regime of right to information for citizens to secure access to information under the control of public authorities, in order to promote transparency and accountability in the working of every public authority. NIEPMD has implemented the Right to Information Act 2005 as per the directions of Central Information Commission, Government of India and Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan), Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Govt. of India. The Central Public Information Officer headed by the Director of the Institute who is the Appellate Authority is responsible for providing information to the person who seeks information under the RTI Act. The Public Information Officer serves as the liaison officer and handles correspondence with the authorities concerned. While discharging duties assigned under RTI Act, the Institute received 39 RTI applications and replies to the queries that are sent within the stipulated time. Quarterly returns pertaining to RTI are filed and submitted to Central Information Commission online as per the prescribed guidelines.

### **11.4 Implementation of Official Language**

The Committee constituted for the purpose of Hindi implementation in this Institute is following all instructions issued by the Department of Official Language (Ministry of Home Affairs) for better use of Hindi in official matters. The office seals and office letter pads are made in bilingual. The RTI applications received in Hindi were replied in Hindi. This Institute's monthly report letter had been sent in Hindi and also the question papers pertaining to various examinations were prepared in bilingual and also students are permitted to write the examination in Hindi.

### **11.5. Public Grievances**

During the year 2015- 16, 4 Public Grievances was received through Public Grievance portal. The reply has been prepared and sent to the complainant.

## Chapter 12

### Composite Regional Centre for Persons with Disabilities

Composite Regional Centre (CRC) for the Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan) at Kozhikode, Kerala was established by Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Dept. of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities, Govt. of India) to provide comprehensive rehabilitation to the Person with Disabilities (Divyangjan). It has been functioning at Social Welfare complex, Vellimadukunnu, since 2011 under the administrative control of NIEPMD. It provides technical and manpower support to CRC. The Objectives of CRC-Kozhikode are as follows.

1. To undertake human resource development by training rehabilitation professionals, village level workers, multi-rehabilitation workers and other functionaries in Government and Non-Govt. sector, required for providing services to persons with disabilities (Divyangjan).
2. To undertake public education programs for creation of awareness in the parents and the community.
3. To undertake designing, fabrication and fitment of aids and appliances.
4. To undertake services of education and skill development leading to enhancement of opportunities for employment, rehabilitation, mobility, communication, recreation and integration in society.

5. To undertake research and development with specific reference to needs of diverse groups of people with disability, keeping in view the nature and severity of disability in the region.
6. To develop strategies for delivery of rehabilitation services suitable to the socio-cultural background of the region.
7. To stimulate growth of services by encouraging and supporting voluntary organization, parent groups and self-help groups.
8. To establish linkages with existing medical, educational and employment services following the principles of community-based rehabilitation and offer extension services in the rural areas.

## **Chapter 13**

### **Audit Reports & Annual Accounts**

An amount of Rs.19.29 crores were total receipts for the year 2015.16, among those an amount of Rs.3.07 crore was closing balance for the year 2014-15, Rs.15.89 crores had been received as Grants-in-aid from MSJ&E, GOI, and Rs.0.33 crores was collected as receipts, RIP Interest and SB interest for the year 2015-16. The Recurring and Non-Recurring expenses during the year 2015-16 was Rs.14.08 crores and the closing balance as on 31<sup>st</sup> March 2016 amounting to Rs.5.21 crores will be carried over for the year 2016-17.

In terms of section 20(1) of C&AG's (DPC) Act, 1971, the CAG, New Delhi had entrusted audit of Annual Accounts of NIEPMD for a period of 5 years from financial year 2006- 2011 and extended another period of 5 years from 2010-11 to 2015-16 vide O.M. No.1.(16)-B(R)/2011, dated 27-07-2011 from Department of Economic affairs, Ministry of Finance to the Director General of Audit (CENTRAL), Chennai. Accordingly, the DAG(C), Chennai is auditing the annual accounts of NIEPMD.

For the financial year 2015-16, the audited statement of accounts comprising of accounts statement, balance sheet, Income & Expenditure statement and receipts and payments details which were submitted to the Director General of Audit (Central), Chennai. The audit team was deputed by the Director General of Audit (Central), Chennai visited NIEPMD for audit from 06.09.2016 to 15.09. 2016. The Audit Report, Audit Certificate and certified accounts of the institute for the Financial Year 2016-17 were received from the office of the Director General of Audit (Central) vide letter No: PDA(C)/CAB/I/28-52/2016-17/99 dated 08.12.2016.

**Separate Audit Report of the Comptroller & Auditor General of India on the Accounts of National Institute for Empowerment of Persons with Multiple Disabilities, Chennai for the year ended 31 March 2016**

We have audited the attached Balance Sheet of National Institute for Empowerment of Persons with Multiple Disabilities, Chennai as at 31<sup>st</sup> March 2016, Income & Expenditure Account and Receipts & Payment Account for the year ended on that date under section 20(1) of the Comptroller & Auditor General's (Duties, Powers and Conditions of Service) Act, 1971. The audit has been entrusted for the period up to 2015-2016. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Institute's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

2. This Separate Audit Report contains the comments of the Comptroller & Auditor General of India (CAG) on the accounting treatment only with regard to classification, conformity with the best accounting practices, accounting, standards and disclosure norms, etc. Audit observations on financial transactions with regard to compliance with the Law, Rules & Regulations (Propriety and Regularity) and efficiency-cum-performance aspects, etc., if any are reported through Inspection Report/CAG's Audit Reports separately.
3. We have conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in India. These standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidences supporting the amounts and disclosure in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of financial statements. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.
4. Based on our audit, we report that:
  - i. We have obtained all the information and explanations, which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for the purpose of our audit.
  - ii. The Balance Sheet, Income & Expenditure Account and Receipt & Payment Account dealt with by this report have been drawn up in the format approved by Government of India, Ministry of Finance.



- iii. In our opinion, proper books of accounts and other relevant records have been maintained by National Institute for Empowerment of Persons with Multiple Disabilities, Chennai as required in the rules and regulations of the Institute in so far as it appears from our examination of such books.
- iv. We further report that:

## **A. Balance Sheet**

### **Liabilities**

#### **Schedule 3- Earmarked Endowment Funds – Composite Regional Centre, Kozhikode.**

The Institute had incorrectly accounted Rs.10 Lakh spent towards 'construction of compound wall' under Revenue Expenditure instead of Capital Expenditure resulting in overstatement of Revenue Expenditure and understatement of Capital Expenditure to the above extent.

### **Liabilities**

#### **Schedule 1 – Corpus/Capital Fund**

The Institute is accounting unutilized balance grant as at the end of the previous year and as at the end of current year as addition to capital fund and deduction to capital fund respectively. This is contrary to the Uniform Format of Accounts prescribed for Central Autonomous Bodies.

### **Liabilities**

#### **Schedule 7- Current Liabilities and Provision**

Balance of Caution Money Deposit as on 31.03.2016 as per the workings mentioned in the reply was Rs.22,26,903, where as in the annual accounts the balance of Caution Money Deposits was incorrectly accounted as Rs.21,13,581. This needs to be reconciled.

## **B. General**

#### **Schedule 24- Accounting Policies and Schedule 7 B – Provisions 2,3 and 4 and liability of Rs.1,04,73,885 under Schedule 7 A – current liabilities 8- Pension Gratuity liability**

Provision for retirement benefit was not made on the basis of actual valuation as prescribed in Accounting Standard 15. Further significant accounting policy should be changed accordingly in line with Accounting standard 15.





### **Note 1 and Note 2 – Schedule 25 – Notes forming part of the annual accounts**

As per Note 1 – Schedule 25- Notes forming part of the annual accounts, it was stated autonomous bodies. However, it was mentioned in Note 2 that pay and allowances of regular staff, retirement benefits, receipt of tuition fees, accounting of Government Grants and purchase of medicines to clients were accounted on cash basis, which is contrary to uniform format of accounting and accrual basis of accounting.

#### **C. Effect of revision in accounts**

The accounts of the Institute were revised on the basis of audit observations. As a result of revision, Assets and liabilities were increased by Rs.0.44 crore and the surplus was decreased by Rs.0.09 crore.

#### **D. Grants in Aid**

Out of the total grant of Rs.18.35 crore received during the year 2015-16 (NIEPMD Main A/c- Rs.15.89 crore, ADIP Scheme Rs.1.47 crore CRC, Kozhikode Rs.0.99 Crore), Internal Income of Rs.0.39 crore (NIEPMD Main A/c – Rs.0.33 Crore, ADIP scheme Rs.0.01 crore CRC, Kozhikode Rs.0.05 Crore) and Rs.3.86 crore being the grant brought forward from the previous year, the institute could utilize Rs.15.72 crore leaving a balance of Rs.6.88 crore (NIEPMD Main A/c – Rs.5.21 crore, ADIP scheme – Rs.1.03 crore and CRC, Kozhikode – Rs.0.64 crore ) as at 31st March 2016.

v. Subject to our observations in the preceding paragraphs, we report that the Balance Sheet, Income & Expenditure Accounts and Receipt & Payment Account dealt with by this report are in agreement with the books of accounts.

vi. In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations give to us, the said financial statements read together with the Accounting Policies and Notes on Accounts, and subject to the significant matters stated above and other matters mentioned in Annexure to this Audit Report give a true and fair view in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in India.


